

NY Tech Alliance Teams with ACM for '2nd Annual NYC ACM Celebration of Women in Computing' on March 31

One-day conference to educate and inspire undergraduate women studying computer science

March 23, 2017 – The NY Tech Alliance, in partnership with the New York City Chapter of the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM), will present the 2nd Annual NYC ACM Celebration of Women in Computing on Friday, March 31, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at Google HQ in New York City. Sponsored by Verizon, Microsoft, and event host Google, the one-day conference aims to educate and inspire undergraduate women studying computer science through a series of panel discussions, hands-on workshops, and networking opportunities designed to help them connect with their peers as well as industry professionals.

The event will kick off with a keynote presentation from Deborah Estrin, Professor of Computer Science at Cornell Tech, who will discuss her role at Cornell Tech and her career path in computer science. Attendees will then receive hands-on instruction on mastering technical job interviews, learn more about framework testing and optimizing code quality, explore the capabilities of IBM Watson, and hear stories from their peers during the panel discussions "Where Do I Fit In?" and "I Am a Software Engineer." Speakers will include tech experts and executives from companies such as Google, IBM, Conde Nast, Greenhouse Software, Knewton, Code Climate, and more.
